

A Year of Growth and Gratitude in Gallatin 4-H

The 2024–2025 4-H year was one of record growth and meaningful change for Gallatin County 4-H. With 675 youth members—the highest enrollment since before COVID—and 138 certified adult volunteers, the program continues to thrive as a cornerstone of youth development in the community. With 12 active clubs across the county, the program serves youth from urban, suburban, and rural areas through a wide range of project offerings to provide youth with opportunities to develop confidence, citizenship, and life skills that will last a lifetime.

Youth participation expanded into several new projects, including Livestock Judging, Welding, and Quilting, while long-standing favorites such as Cloverbuds, Dog Obedience, Robotics, Baking, and Sewing continued to thrive, many reaching full capacity due to strong interest and demand. In addition, county-level educational workshops offered youth instruction on record keeping, interview skills, and parliamentary procedure. Volunteer development remained a priority with a Winter Volunteer Training Series, facilitated in partnership with various MSU Extension professionals, to provide learning sessions on positive youth development, leadership, and program planning. These efforts strengthened volunteer confidence and supported consistent, high-quality programming across clubs and projects. A focus on continuous improvement guided internal operations throughout the year under the theme "Revise and Revamp." The office and 4-H committees worked collaboratively to streamline processes, update materials, and realign budgets to better serve the emerging needs of youth and families. Our program celebrated 44 graduating seniors in 2025, the largest class in recent memory. Maintaining active involvement among older youth remains a statewide challenge, and this milestone reflects the effectiveness of local leadership and program diversity in keeping teens engaged through their senior year. In response, the Gallatin County 4-H Foundation committee expanded its scholarship program to include support not only for traditional four-year degrees but also vocational and apprenticeship pathways—reflecting the diverse futures our 4-H members pursue.

Hands, Heart, and Hard Work

The 2025 program year showcased the dedication, creativity, and strong work ethic that define Gallatin County 4-H members and volunteers. Through experiential learning, leadership opportunities, and community engagement, Gallatin County 4-H continues to empower youth to live the 4-H pledge—using their hands for larger service, hearts for greater loyalty, and hard work for lasting impact.

The 2025 Gallatin County 4-H/FFA Fair serves as one of the program's most visible and impactful events. 4-H families contributed more than 2,000 volunteer hours preparing fairgrounds and facilities to host 344 youth exhibitors and over 1,000 animals across multiple species. A total of 393 market animals were sold, reflecting the dedication and responsibility of local youth. The livestock sale once again exceeded \$1.4 million, underscoring the community's ongoing investment in youth agricultural education. The fair continues to serve as a capstone experience, providing members with opportunities to demonstrate learning, professionalism, and community connection.



Due to facility and management challenges, the 4-H Café was not operated during the 2025 Big Sky Country State Fair. Rebuilding or re-envisioning the Café remains a key objective for 2026, as it has traditionally served as a major fundraiser, service project, and public engagement space.

In the meantime, Gallatin County 4-H continued to manage concessions at Montana State University home football games and other events at Bobcat Stadium and the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse. This partnership offers meaningful fundraising opportunities and hands-on experience in customer service, teamwork, and financial management; providing both program income and valuable visibility for 4-H in the community.

Teen leadership development remained a hallmark of the program. The County Ambassador Team was re-established, with teen leaders mentoring younger members and contributing to county-level initiatives. Gallatin 4-H was represented at all major statewide events, including Fall Leadership Training, Montana 4-H Congress, and the Legislative Breakfast. The 2025 Gallatin 4-H Camp welcomed 66 campers supported by 38 trained teen counselors. The "Out of This World" space-themed program emphasized hands-on educational, recreational, and creative learning experiences.

Through the collective efforts of members, volunteers, and community partners, Gallatin County 4-H continues to build lifelong skills in leadership, service, and citizenship.






Why Community Service Matters

- **Strengthen Skills for the Future:** From teamwork to planning and problem-solving, service projects provide hands-on experience with skills that will benefit them in all aspects of life.





Unlimited Leaders Council

The mission of the Gallatin 4-H Unlimited Leaders Council (ULC) is to teach life skills by providing positive, hands-on, and educational opportunities for and with youth, through the recruitment, training, and development of caring 4-H volunteers in the hope of creating healthy, proactive futures in a global world.

The primary purpose of the Unlimited Leaders Council (ULC) is to provide guidance and assistance to the county Extension staff in planning and conducting educational programs. In addition, the 4-H council advises the county Extension staff in the establishment of the county 4-H policies that are not in conflict with the state 4-H policy statement. Gallatin County Unlimited Leaders Council is the governing body of Gallatin County 4-H and all the committees within the county 4-H program.

Gallatin 4-H Foundation

The mission of the Gallatin 4-H Foundation is to aid and promote, by financial assistance and support, all types of 4-H Programs and other Extension Youth Programs.

Market Livestock Committee

The purpose of the Market Livestock Committee is to develop and promote all livestock projects (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Rabbit, and Poultry) in 4-H and FFA on a county-wide basis. They provide members the educational experience and support to responsibly raise, care for, and sell their 4-H/FFA market animals; organize & facilitate the Gallatin County 4-H/FFA Market Sale; create and enforce the FairBook Rules specific to all livestock species; and work together as a committee to set and enforce the standard for all livestock projects.

Market Sale: \$1,450,184

With a growing number of 4-H members joining market projects, our sales total continues to climb too. The Market Sale committee does keep a small 5% commission to help fund the following year's sale expenses.



Project Auction Baskets: \$5675

Projects have a silent auction of baskets filled with fun and exciting items to help earn money to fund programs and prizes for their project.



Exhibitor Take Home: \$1,347,007

This money goes straight to the 4-H members, projects from auction baskets minus the 5% retained for next year's fair expenses.



Expenses: \$ 1,453,744

These sale expenses include tents for Fair week, judges, animal transport, tables, chairs, BBQ food, and catering to feed our buyers and families on sale night and many more! (Also includes payouts to exhibitors)
